Travel & Exchange Programs Congratulations! You are almost at the finish line. You are on your way to a new and exciting chapter of your education. Below are ten practical tips to keep in mind as you transition to life as a college or university student:

1. Talk to your parents/guardians or someone else who can help you put a budget in place. Most schools have a <u>budgeting & financial literacy</u> page on their website or you can use a simple <u>Student Budget Worksheet</u>.

2. Log into your university or college student account and take note of any scholarship or bursary application deadlines. Research scholarships and bursaries on the school website. Collect information & build a timeline of when award applications are due. Most deadlines remain the same from year to year. Note: If you missed the Admissions Bursary deadline, you may apply for the general bursary in the fall.

3. In the summer, participate in any summer orientation program that your school offers. In the fall, take your school's workshops on time management, organization, and study skills.

4. Renewable scholarships have conditions which may include maintaining a minimum course load or grade point average. If you are entering university or college with a renewable scholarship, try to maintain your grades so that it will be renewed each year.

5. Join an on-campus club or association, or find a volunteer opportunity, that is aligned with your studies and future goals. These activities can help strengthen your skills and provide networking opportunities while making a difference in your school or local community. They can also build up your resume and/or an application for graduate studies.

6. Get to know your instructors. Go to office hours. Your instructors will give you feedback on your work. They may be able to give you a reference if you need one. And sometimes they hire students to do research in the summer.

7. If you need to work part-time, look into work study programs at your school, e.g., Laurier University's <u>work study program</u>. Most schools offer a wide range of part-time jobs to help students with financial need. Also, check out the university or college online job board, connect with career services, and/or attend on- or off-campus job fairs and expos.



Notes on OSAP

The <u>Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP</u>) is disbursed in two installments: September (60%) and January (40%). You must apply every school year.

You must apply to OSAP if you want to be eligible for other university/ college financial aid. When you apply for bursaries, it is sometimes a requirement to have already applied for OSAP to demonstrate that you have exhausted all other resources.

If you are not approved for funding or you would like a review of the funding amount, you can request a funding review. Talk to your Financial Aid Office. Below are three examples of situations where you can request a review for OSAP purposes:

- Example 1: Request for Review: Adjust Living Allowance (Form) You don't live in your parent's home or in a home owned by them during your study period, and your parents live within thirty kilometres of the school you are attending.
- Example 2: Request to Use Parent's Estimated Income (Form) Your parent's financial situation changed in 2022 because of unexpected and/or one-time circumstances, such as loss of full-time employment and/or new employment at a lower pay rate; or illness, accident, or retirement; and/or receipt of a severance package, insurance settlement or other one-time income payout.
- Example 3: Request for Review: Adjust Local Travel in Study Period (Form)

You drive more than thirty kilometres from your home to your campus or school placement; or you drive because it takes more than one hour by public transit to get from your home to your campus or school placement; or you drive because there is no public transit between your home and your campus or school placement; or you have exceptional public transit costs from your home to your campus or school placement, e.g., You are required to use multiple transit systems or non-municipal transit.

IMPORTANT: Your main OSAP contact is the Financial Aid Office (FAO) at your school. You must notify them of any changes to your address and/or your financial, academic, family, and/or study period status. Your income must be reported accurately or your eligibility for future aid may be impacted. You cannot edit your online OSAP application.

REMINDERS

Ontario colleges:

The colleges require payment of a tuition deposit in June to secure your spot in your program. Check your email and mail daily. Keep track of all deadlines including the registration deposit, residence application and deposit, and tuition deposit.

Ontario universities:

June 1 is the earliest date an Ontario high school student may be required to respond to an Ontario university offer of admission and give a financial commitment. All other admission-related elements, including scholarships, other forms of student assistance or financial incentives, and offers of residence are considered part of the offer of admission. Check your email and mail daily. Keep track of all deadlines including the registration deposit, residence application and deposit, and tuition deposit.

Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP):

Apply for OSAP before June 30. From the time you submityour application and required documents, it usually takes about three-six weeks to receive a response.

Search for programs that still have spaces available at Ontario universities and colleges:

College: Use the <u>Find a Program</u> tool and you can see whether a program is open, closed, or waitlisted by checking the Availability column. If it is open, the college is still accepting applications to the program.

University: The Admission Information Service (AIS) allows you to determine which Ontario universities still have spots available in first-year undergraduate programs. The AIS opens June 3. See the Admission Information Service Flyer.

DISCOUNTS FOR COLLEGE & UNIVERSITY STUDENTS

<u>eCampusOntario</u> offers "Open Library" where you can access nearly 300 textbooks and resources that can be downloaded for FREE.

<u>Microsoft</u> offers Office 365 Education for FREE through most colleges & universities. Office 365 Includes Word, Excel, PowerPoint, OneNote, and Microsoft Teams, plus additional classroom tools. Use your valid school email address to get started.

The <u>Student Price Card (SPC)</u> is a student loyalty discount program offering discounts and deals on items such as fashion, food, shoes, travel and more. Find out more about it <u>here</u>.

TIP 1: Buy used textbooks. In many cases it is not necessary to buy the newest edition. Check out your school's online community for textbook listings in the Classifieds section.

TIP 2: You can opt out of health and dental insurance (included in your fees) if you are already covered by your parents/guardians. It may be a few hundred dollars each year. The deadlines to opt out are usually in September.

INCOMING GRADE 12S: PREPARE FOR THE FUTURE

This summer, take some time to start thinking about scholarship preparation and your future goals. Here are some ideas to consider:

Volunteer: Community service is a requirement on many scholarship applications. Helping others is worthwhile in and of itself! Do try to volunteer in a field that interests you and aligns with your future goals.

Develop your leadership skills: Lead in a volunteer capacity, in your job, or in your activities. Create your own initiative, e.g., fundraiser, community project, etc. Or start your own business!

Find a part-time job: Again, try to work in a field that aligns with your future studies. If you cannot find a job, ask if you can job shadow or request an internship (if you can afford it). No matter what job you have, you can work on skills for the future.

McDonald's Canada is looking to hire <u>25,000 workers</u>. The "crew can expect to learn teamwork, leadership, agility, resilience, decision-making and more." These are "important skills that can be used in other jobs."

Start saving: Try budgeting this summer. It takes practice and diligence. Start now and prepare for your future.

SCHOLARSHIP UPDATES

Note: Updates are listed when there is a new deadline and/or additional information, or when a scholarship is no longer offered.

(O) Institute for Advancements in Mental Health Scholarship Program

Open to individuals living with schizophrenia or psychosis.

Award: Scholarships typically range from between \$1000- \$5000, with the average amount being around \$2500.

Deadline: June 6

(O) Autism Ontario: The David Conforti – Reach for the Stars Award

This award is to recognize volunteerism with community impact among other people with autism. **Award:** One \$500 award **Deadline:** June 10

Opterus Rebel with a Cause Awards

Open to young women, between the ages of 18-26, and who are enrolled/will enrol at a Canadian postsecondary institution, and who are pursuing a STEM or Arts educational path.

Award: Two awards of \$10,000 each. **Deadline:** June 18.

Public Service Alliance of Canada (PSAC) Scholarships

Open to dependent children of current PSAC members.

Award: \$1000-\$4000 scholarships. Deadline: June 24.

Heritage Club Scholarships

Open to dependent children of all active members of a Heritage Club Chapter. **Award:** Three \$2,000 scholarships. **Deadline:** Postmarked by June 30.

Justin Eves Foundation (JEF)

Open to students with a documented learning disability who meet the <u>application criteria</u>.

Award: Typical bursary (grant) amounts are \$2,000 for college programs and \$3,000 for university programs. There is also the potential for a "Friends" scholarship for exceptional applicants in the amount of \$5,000.

Deadline: June 30.

Institute of Food Technologists (IFT) Foundation: Feeding Tomorrow Scholarships for First Year Students

Open to students planning to enroll as a fulltime freshman student pursuing an undergraduate degree in the science of food at a U.S. or international university. **Award:** Multiple awards. **Deadline:** July 1, 3 p.m. CT.

(O) Epilepsy Ontario Scholarship

Open to students across Ontario who are living with epilepsy. **Award:** Four \$1,500 scholarships **Deadline:** July 8.

(O) Mon Sheong Foundation: Golden Jubilee Scholarship

Open to students graduating from an Ontario high school with a minimum average of 80% among their top six Grade 12 marks and who are aspiring to make a difference in their communities.

Award: Two recipients will receive \$1,000 per year for the duration of their studies, up to a maximum of four years (subject to renewal requirements). **Deadline:** July 10.

(O) Ontario Public Service Employees Union (OPSEU): Fred Upshaw Scholarship

Open to dependents of Black and other racialized OPSEU/SEFPO members in good standing who are pursuing studies in labour relations and/or social justice and human rights. Award: \$1000.

Deadline: July 30.

(O) Ontario Public Service Employees Union (OPSEU): Larry Cripps Scholarship Fund

Open to dependents of OPSEU/SEFPO members in good standing who are confirmed as enrolled in either a Police Foundations Course or a Law and Security/ Corrections course. **Award:** \$1,000.

Deadline: July 30.

De Beers Group Scholarships for Canadian Women

Open to female students entering a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) or STEM-related program. Preference will be given to Indigenous women or women of Indigenous descent. Preference will also be given to those who are in Northern Ontario, Southern Alberta, Northwest Territories, and Nunavut.

Award: Ten awards valued at \$4,500 each. **Deadline:** July 31.

MORE SCHOLARSHIPS WITH JUNE-JULY DEADLINES

(O) Water Environment Association of Ontario (WEAO): Kelman Scholarship

Open to a student that has an interest in environmental issues, particularly water quality protection. **Eligibility:** The applicant is planning on attending college or university in a related field of study. The application requires a 500-word essay outlining the applicant's interests in environmental issues related to water quality protection and how they might use these interests as an educational and career opportunity. **Award:** \$500.

Deadline: June 17.

Canadian Council of Muslim Women (CCMW): Lila Fahlman Scholarships

Open to Canadian Muslim women.

Eligibility: The applicant must be a Canadian citizen or a permanent resident of Canada. They must be enrolled in a fulltime undergraduate diploma or certificate program at a Canadian college or university for the upcoming academic year. The applicant must be making a recognized positive contribution to society through civic engagement and/or volunteering experience. Considerable preference will be given to individuals who express familiarity and connection with the mission of CCMW as a highly diverse organization with a mission to affirm the identities of Muslim women in Canada through faith, social justice, and meaningful community engagement. The application requires a 500-word essay describing the reasons why the applicant would be a worthy recipient of this scholarship, including their contribution to civic engagement at the community level, other volunteer activities, academic achievements, their most important accomplishments, and future goals.

Award: \$1000.

Deadline: June 30. **Contact:** info@ccmw.com.

(O) Workers Health & Safety Centre Student Scholarships

Open to any fulltime high school student beginning their first year in fulltime or part-time studies at an Ontario college or university.

Eligibility: The applicant must reside in Ontario. The application requires an essay (600-1,000 words) on a topic given in the application package. Scholarship recipients will be chosen based on a weighted average of the essay submission and their co-curricular contributions to their school and larger community. The essay will count for ³/₄ of the total weight and co-curricular contributions will count for ¹/₄ of the total weight.

Award: Two \$2,000 scholarships. Up to three additional entries may be selected to receive \$1,000 each. **Deadline:** July 14, 4 p.m.

🗹 Loans Canada's Financial Literacy Scholarship

Open to students who are enrolled or accepted for enrolment as a fulltime or part-time student at an accredited postsecondary institution. If you can demonstrate exceptional financial management skills, you are encouraged to apply.

Eligibility: The applicant must be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident. Students must demonstrate financial literacy and practice constructive money skills regardless of their grades or GPA. The application requires a letter telling how financial literacy has made a difference in your life. Tell how you've budgeted, saved, invested, paid down debt, applied for as many scholarships as possible or how your side-hustle has helped you bring in extra cash. Tell how your exceptional financial management efforts has made a positive impact in your life. Share what you've learned and how you intend on using your financial knowledge to build a better future for yourself.

Award: \$750.

Deadline: July 30.

Mining Diesel Emissions Council (MDEC) Scholarship

Open to students who have or plan to have an affiliation with the mining industry.

Eligibility: The applicant must be accepted as a fulltime student into a recognized program in an approved Canadian university or college. They must demonstrate their commitment to academic success, community service, and who have or plan to have an

affiliation with the mining industry. Academic success will be the primary criteria for consideration for a general scholarship. The application requires an essay of 500 words or less that answers the prompt on the website.

Award: \$2,000. Deadline: July 30. Contact: jstachulak@mirarco.org.

Disability Credit Canada: DCCI Scholarship for Canadian Students with Disabilities

Open to a Canadian high school student with a documented disability.

Eligibility: The applicant must be currently registered to a fulltime program of study in the field of health care, criminal justice, or community & social services at an accredited Canadian postsecondary college or university. The applicant must be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident of Canada. The applicant must be under 20 years of age at the time of application. The application requires an essay of 500-700 words responding to a prompt on the website.

Award: \$1,000.

Deadline: July 31, 6 p.m. EST.

AUGUST DEADLINES

(O) Central Canada Exhibition Legacy Scholarship (Eastern Ontario)

Open to an active 4-H member who has been an active member for at least five consecutive years. **Eligibility:** The applicant must be pursuing further career development at a postsecondary institution or in an apprenticeship program. The application requires a 500-word essay on your contribution to the community and plans for future community engagement.

Award: Not listed. Deadline: August 1. *See other awards on the website page. Contact: inquiries@4-hontario.ca.

Indspire: Building Brighter Futures (BBF) Scholarships, Bursaries and Awards

Open to First Nations, Inuit, and Metis students. **Eligibility:** <u>Awards and bursaries</u> are assessed on financial need, merit, and giving back (community involvement). Any source of volunteering, e.g., your school, elder care, family care, SPCA, local hospital, church, Indigenous organization (longhouse), sports team, is beneficial to your application. This area is viewed and scored. Students who do not have any hours will not receive a score in this section and lower their chance of being successful. <u>Scholarships</u> are assessed on merit and are not based on financial need. However, there are very few scholarships.

<u>Scholarships, Bursaries and Awards for Postsecondary</u> <u>Education</u>: Full- and part-time studies in college, university, skilled trades, apprenticeships, and technology programs.

<u>Scholarships, Bursaries and Awards for Postsecondary</u> <u>Education – Skilled Trades</u>: Part-time or fulltime certificate or diploma programs (one month- to four-year programs).

Award: \$1,000-\$30,000.

Deadline: August 1, November 1, February 1. **Contact:** education@indspire.ca.

International Union of Operating Engineers (I.U.O.E.): Canadian Conference Bursary

Open to dependents of a member of a Canadian local of the Operating Engineers.

Eligibility: Applicants must be entering their first or subsequent year of a fulltime course of study (at least two years in length) leading to a diploma, certificate, or degree from any recognized public Canadian college or university. The application requires a 1000word essay on the reason why the bursary will be of assistance, or the impact that being a dependent of a union member has had on the applicant's life. **Award:** Ten \$750 bursaries. Two of the bursaries are allotted to applicants from British Columbia.

Nelson Civic Leadership Scholarship

Open to students in Grade 12.

Eligibility: Applicants must demonstrate academic success, personal strength, and determination in their commitment to civic engagement and leadership. **Award:** One \$10,000 scholarship.

Nelson Indigenous Student Scholarship

Open to Indigenous students.

Award: One \$10,000 scholarship. **Deadline:** August 1.

United Steelworkers (USW): Local 1944 Scholarships

Open to a child of an active member of USW Local 1944 graduating from Grade 12.

Eligibility: Applicants must be registering for courses at a public postsecondary institution. The scholarship program considers leadership values and labour knowledge. This is an educational opportunity for students who are making a difference in their communities.

(O) OPSEU (Ontario Public Service Employees Union): Curt Bishop Scholarship

Open to dependents of OPSEU/SEFPO members in good standing.

Eligibility: Applicants must be studying at a publicly funded, publicly-run postsecondary institution in Ontario. The application requires a 1500-word essay or a photo series, short video, poem, audio file, or visual art piece responding to the given prompt on the website. **Award:** \$1000.

(O) Bill 7 Award

Open to students who identify as lesbian, gay, bi-sexual, transgender, two-spirited or queer.

Eligibility: Applicants must be attending or accepted by a postsecondary educational Institution in Ontario. They must be pursuing their FIRST postsecondary program of study. Applicants must demonstrate financial need after accessing available public financial supports.

Open to students who received a bronze, silver, or gold medal at the 2022 Skills Ontario Competition. **Eligibility:** Applicants must be an Ontario resident and they must possess a Canadian citizenship or landed immigrant status. They must have earned high school credits any time during the current school year (September 2021 to June 2022) and will graduate in the spring, summer, or fall of 2022. Applicants must be pursuing a postsecondary education as an apprentice or through a postsecondary institution within Ontario. Applicants must provide proof of volunteer work/community service. (O) Ontario Provincial Police Association (OPPA) Credit Union Scholarship Awards

Open to dependent children of OPPA Credit Union members, excluding employees and board members. (Persons applying must be a member of the OPPA Credit Union at the time of the application and the draw. The scholarship is awarded by a random draw on August 25.).

Eligibility: Applicants must be entering their first year of postsecondary education at an eligible institution as approved by the Ministry of Education and Training, such as Canadian colleges and universities and including all registered private vocational schools, accredited American universities and their affiliates, and accredited international universities and their affiliates.

Award: \$1000.

Open to a Student Chapter Member or child/ward of a salaried employee of an MCAC member company. **Eligibility:** Applicants must be enrolled in a fulltime postsecondary program leading to a degree, certificate, or diploma from an accredited Canadian university, college, or apprenticeship program, with a minimum "B" average for the previous year. Applicants may also be a registered apprentice in a mechanical contracting trade. They must not otherwise receive a major scholarship or bursary.

Award: Various (\$800-\$5,000). **Deadline:** August 12.

Ontario Sheet Metal (OSM) Contractors Association: Wally McIntosh Memorial Scholarship

Open to children of OSM member firm employees who are graduating from high school.

Eligibility: Applicants must be entering college or university studies. They must achieve a minimum of 75% average on six Grade 12 subjects. The application must include a recommendation from the applicant's school principal. Applicants must have demonstrated leadership qualities through involvement in extracurricular or community activities which includes volunteer work. Evaluation criteria includes academic achievement (grade average), academic extracurricular activities, community activities, leadership qualities, and employment history.

ATCO Indigenous Education Awards Program

Open to Canadian Indigenous students.

Eligibility: Applicants must be enrolled fulltime in high school (including upgrading) or in an accredited postsecondary institution or training program. Applicants must not be the child of an ATCO employee. The awards, bursaries and scholarships are given to students who demonstrate leadership capabilities and strive to be role models in their schools and communities. The application requires a short essay (500-1,000 words) describing why you are a suitable candidate. Preference will be given to students from Indigenous communities where ATCO has business interests.

<u>Merit Award</u>s: \$500 for students completing Grades 10-12, including upgrading.

<u>Bursaries</u>: \$1,000 for students enrolled in trade, diploma, or certificate programs.

<u>Scholarships</u>: \$1,500 for students enrolled in degree or graduate programs.

Deadline: August 15.

CN Pensioners Association (CNPA) Scholarships

Open to children, grandchildren, great grandchildren (includes legally adopted and stepchildren and step grandchildren) of supporting members of CN Pensioners Association in receipt of a CN Pension and in good standing for at least one year prior to date of scholarship application.

Eligibility: Applicants must be enrolled fulltime at an accredited university or college. They must be attending a college or university in Canada or the U.S. Applicants must have a minimum 80% average over the most recent two full school years in order to be considered. Awards will be based and weighted on several factors not just marks. The resume is a very important piece of the selection process.

Award: Twenty-five \$1,500 scholarships. The scholarships will be distributed and available as follows: Five \$1,500 scholarships in each of the five Canadian Regions (Atlantic, Quebec, Ontario, Prairie, and Mountain) for the fall school year.
