TOP TIPS FOR WRITING A SCHOLARSHIP ESSAY

Scholarship providers receive hundreds of applications each year. How can you make YOUR essay stand out from the crowd?

Know your audience. Before you begin to write your essay, be sure to familiarize yourself with the school or scholarship sponsor's website. Read their mission / vision / *About* page. Make note of any key words and repeated phrases such as *citizenship*, *leadership*, *community*, *service*, *volunteerism*, etc. These words reveal what the organization values. Address these themes in your responses or essay.

Take note of the specific criteria for the scholarship candidate.

There will often be a list of traits that describe the ideal candidate. You may see adjectives such as *leadership*, *integrity*, *humanitarian*, etc. In your essay, *demonstrate* (*with examples*) how you possess these qualities. <u>And be sure to read the eligibility requirements</u>.

Read the biographies/essays of previous scholarship recipients if they are available. This will give you a good indication of what the organization looks for in a candidate.

Be personal and share your story. Emphasize your most meaningful and impactful experiences rather than listing a summary of *all* your activities. Explain the purpose -- the *why* -- that inspires you to do what you do, e.g., to help others, to care for the environment, etc. *Demonstrate* your passion by giving examples and sharing concrete results. For example, if you need to describe your involvement in leadership and/or in the community, be sure to include why you got involved, your responsibilities, the skills that were strengthened, the tangible results, and <u>what you learned</u>.

Describe any challenges and/or obstacles that you have overcome. Focus on <u>what you learned</u> from overcoming these challenges. How have they contributed to your personal growth and development of your skills?

Expand on your long-term goals. Articulate a clear and concise list of future aspirations/goals. A student who has made plans for their future is more likely to win a scholarship than one who has no clear goals. Your past accomplishments can be a good predictor of future success.

Be meticulous in following the rules and regulations. Read the essay instructions carefully and take note of essentials such as word limit,

font size, spacing, etc. For example, if a 500- 600-word essay is required, remain within those limits. Word count is very important! The scholarship committee will expect you to be able to adhere to simple instructions. If not, your application could be excluded from consideration.

Have someone proofread/edit

your essay. A well-written essay, free of errors, is an important factor that is considered when applications are first reviewed. Make sure there is enough time before the application submission deadline to have another person proofread your essay. Incorrect spelling, structural problems in the essay, grammatical errors—all will hinder your chances of success.

Key takeaway:

The essay should give a glimpse as to who you are as an individual—your character, your passions, your goals, and plans. If you let your uniqueness shine through, your essay is sure to make an impression.

Guidance counselors can be excellent resources for information related to financial aid including scholarships, and in helping students navigate the scholarship process. Guidance counsellors also support students with the completion of scholarship packages as well as providing transcripts and letters of reference.

Many Guidance Departments keep students informed of available opportunities by posting information on bulletin boards and on the Guidance page on the school website or on sites such as *myBlueprint*, or via email or newsletter. Some schools use their Twitter accounts as a tool to distribute scholarship information.

One important element of the scholarship search is your own engagement with the guidance counsellor. Make an appointment with your Guidance Department and let them know you are actively looking for scholarships.

The Ontario Learn and Stay Grant

Students will be eligible to receive full, upfront funding for tuition, books, and other direct educational costs in exchange for years of service in specific professions and specific priority communities.

Choose to study in fields and professions that are needed the most. Grant applications for the 2024-25 academic year open in the spring, targeting 2,500 postsecondary students who in enrol in the following <u>programs and</u> <u>regions</u>:

NEWS

- As of fall 2024, <u>Canadian students from outside Quebec</u> who come to study at a university in the province will pay twice as much in tuition. The minimum cost for out-ofprovince students to study in Quebec is currently set at \$8,992. With the change, it will go up to about \$17,000.
- The University of Toronto has launched a <u>tuition-free</u> <u>initiative for nine First Nations</u> whose territories include or are adjacent to its campuses in downtown Toronto, Mississauga, and Scarborough.
- Western and Brescia University College have begun a process that will see Brescia fully integrate into Western's campus community as of May 2024. Effective immediately, Brescia University College will no longer be accepting students for Fall 2024. Programs in Family Studies and Foods and Nutrition will continue to be offered to students at Western.

5 REASONS WHY YOU SHOULD ATTEND AN OPEN HOUSE

There are many universities and colleges that are opening their doors in November to highlight their campus to prospective students (and families). Here are 5 reasons you should consider attending an Open House, if possible:

1 To become familiar with the campus.

What looks good on paper may end up not being a good fit for you! Attending an Open House allows you to have an in-depth look at the campus: tour classrooms, residences, recreational facilities, etc. The environment you hope to spend the next few years of your life in matters – a lot!

2 To have an opportunity to ask questions.

Yes, you can call or email the university or college to have your questions answered, but most of us aren't going to do that. At an Open House, you can ask those questions – or questions that may come while touring the campus. Getting answers to your questions may help you in deciding which school to attend.

3 To learn more about a specific program of interest and courses offered.

Be sure to attend the academic/departmental information sessions of the program you're interested in. You can talk directly to faculty, staff, and current students from your program area.

4 To attend general information sessions.

At an Open House, presentations are held on many pertinent topics: student services (health and wellness, academic support, etc.), university life, career and co-op education, work-study programs, admission requirements, academics, residences, etc. You can find out how the school can support you.

5 To find out SPECIFICALLY about entrance scholarships, other scholarships, bursaries, and awards.

Attend the Financial Aid presentation or seminar. These are some of the questions you may want to ask:

- Is financial aid available at your school?
- Where can I find out about scholarships and bursaries?
- Do I need to apply for them, or are they awarded automatically?
- How do I find out about part-time jobs on campus?

If you are unable to attend an Open House, consider booking a tour of the campus at another time. There are universities and colleges that offer virtual (online) tours as well.

If you are attending an Open House, pre-register and plan your day to get the most out of it. As well, there may be giveaways offered and a chance to enter contests. Some universities even have a draw for free first-year tuition.

NOVEMBER-DECEMBER CHECKLIST for SENIOR STUDENTS

- ☑ Continue to research careers. Take free career quizzes online.
- ☑ Don't forget to check out the Open House Schedules.
- Narrow down the schools and programs that you are interested in. Research universities and their programs and scholarships at <u>OUInfo</u>. Research colleges and programs at <u>ontariocolleges.ca</u>. Compare costs of tuition, residence fees, and automatic awards at each school. Look into entrance scholarships. If you are looking for an apprenticeship, check out the <u>Ontario Youth Apprentice Program (OYAP)</u>.
- ☑ Submit applications to the postsecondary institutions of your choice. Submit your university application by January 15. Submit your college application by February 1.
- ☑ Focus on your exams. Grade 12 marks continue to matter.
- \square Set aside an hour or two each week to search and apply for scholarships and bursaries.
- ☑ Explore the Student Awards page on the university/college websites of schools you have applied to. Some schools have <u>early application</u> <u>deadlines</u> for Admission Awards. Contact the Financial Aid office at college/university if you need assistance.
- ☑ Let your guidance counselor know that you are interested in scholarships. New scholarship information is sent to them regularly.
- ☑ Update your resume and begin looking for summer employment mid-January.
- \square Save as much money as possible from work, gifts, etc.

APPLYING TO UNIVERSITY AND COLLEGE

UNIVERSITY

The Base Application Fee for your initial three program choices is \$156. For each additional program choice beyond your first three choices, there is an Additional Choice Fee of \$50/choice.

The deadline to submit your completed application to the <u>Ontario Universities' Application Centre (OUAC)</u> is January 15. Note: The OUAC will continue to process applications received after this date and distribute them to the Ontario universities; however, specific university deadlines will apply.

Question: I already submitted my application but I made some mistakes. I am not able to get back into my application. What should I do?

Answer: Once your fee is received at the OUAC and your application has been processed (which may take 1-3 business days), you can make changes or corrections to your application online. You will need your username and password to access your application. See other <u>Frequently Asked Questions</u> (FAQ) for more information.

COLLEGE

Apply to college through <u>ontariocolleges.ca</u>. To begin your college application, you must *create an account*.

Complete and pay on or before February 1 to receive equal consideration for admission to programs. Apply to <u>highly_competitive programs</u> on or before this date. After this date, colleges consider applicants on a first-come, first-served basis until programs are full. Applicants are encouraged to complete their applications well before the Equal Consideration Date, as website volumes on the online application are at their highest at this time. The <u>application processing fee</u> is \$125 (non-refundable). An application allows you up to five program choices, with no more than three choices at any one college.

Some people fear that they will waste their time if they choose not to go to school, so Michelle Dittmer, president of the *Canadian Gap Year Association* weighs in with the 7 things you can do on your gap year that will set you up for a successful and fulfilling future.

Earn Money - School and life are expensive. Get a job to offset your student debt, afford textbooks, save up for a new computer or a trip to somewhere exciting! Working will fill your bank account AND your resume AND help you with the key skills employers are looking for!

2 Get Experience - Volunteer, intern, get a job - not only will you build your resume, but you will also learn about different industries, build your network of people who can help you in the future and get to work on really interesting projects.

(3) Find Direction - How are you supposed to know what you want to do for a career already? Take some time to make a better decision for your future - shadow people or do informational interviews with people in different jobs. Make a list of what you like and don't like and narrow down your options.

4 Start a Business - Sell your art, monetize your YouTube channel, become an influencer, launch a digital product, become a drop shipper - the options are endless. 10 PLACES TO FIND SCHOLARSHIPS TO FUND YOUR POSTSECONDARY EDUCATION

When searching for scholarships, you must know where to look. While many scholarships are listed in *The Scholarship Report*, it is not an exhaustive list. Universities and colleges offer awards, bursaries, and scholarships. But there are other places to consider too. Most scholarship deadlines will be coming up in the next few months. Here are some ideas to get you started on where to find money for university or college:

1. Employers & unions: Many

large corporations offer scholarships to employees and their dependents as part of their employee benefits package. They believe in investing in education and one of the ways they do so is by sponsoring scholarships. <u>Costco</u>, for example, offers up to \$2,500 scholarships for tuition and fees to employees and their children. Ask your parents/guardians to check out their employee handbook. If they belong to a union, there may be scholarships available there as well. If you are working parttime, ask your manager about scholarships.

2. Sports, Clubs, and Youth Programs: Do you participate in any extra-curricular activities outside of school? <u>Curling</u> <u>Canada, Golf Ontario, Sea Cadets</u> -- all of these organizations offer scholarships. Look at your areas of activity and inquire about awards for students.

3. Civic organizations and service clubs: The local and provincial chapters of many national organizations and clubs often sponsor scholarships as a way of serving their community, e.g., <u>Kin Canada</u>, <u>Kiwanis Foundation of Canada</u>, etc. Ask your parents if they are involved in any local chapters of national organizations. Contact the local branches / chapters in your area for more information on any scholarships or bursaries they may offer.

4. Professional associations: What program do you plan to enroll in? Beginning with your program of interest is a good place to start the search. Chemistry? The <u>Chemical Institute</u> of <u>Canada</u> offers a high school scholarship. Retail? The <u>Retail</u> <u>Council of Canada</u> offers scholarships. Horticulture? Check out the <u>Ontario Horticultural Trades Foundation</u>. Scope out scholarships in your area of study.

5. Banks, Credit Unions, and Insurance Companies: You may be aware of the national scholarships sponsored by banks that have large award amounts – the <u>TD Scholarships</u> for Community Leadership is just one example. Many credit

unions give substantial awards for postsecondary education based on your service to the community as well, e.g., <u>Libro Students</u> <u>Awards</u>. Also, insurance companies may offer scholarships to the children (or even grandchildren) of their policyholders, e.g., <u>Johnson Insurance</u>.

> 6. Heritage: Many organizations offer scholarships to those who share the same background. There are scholarships for <u>Portuguese</u> students and <u>Muslim</u> students, for example. Look at your family background and search accordingly.

7. Specific to you: There are awards specifically for female students (Zonta International), students with disabilities (Justin Eves Foundation), and students who have experienced obstacles and yet persevered (The Terry Fox Humanitarian Award). Financial hardship is a main consideration for other awards, e.g., bursaries. There are scholarships for students who are involved in leadership, volunteerism, and sports. And there are always scholarships for those who demonstrate academic excellence.

8. Provincial government: The Ontario government provides financial assistance for "<u>under-represented learners</u>" in the form of grants or bursaries to help pay for postsecondary education. There are grants for Indigenous students, current and former individuals in Extended Society care, first-generation students, students with disabilities, students who are Deaf or hard of hearing, and students who receive financial support through the Ontario Disability Support Program or Ontario Works.

9. Online: Search online using key words such as "scholarship, "bursary," "Ontario," and the program you are pursuing, e.g., nursing. Be sure to narrow the search to provincial and local scholarships. The odds of receiving a "smaller" scholarship are much greater than receiving a national award.

10. All-in-one websites: There are websites that maintain an extensive list of scholarships for one group, e.g.: DisabilityAwards.ca, Indspire for Indigenous students, and Black Business Professional Association (BBPA) Scholarships.

BONUS TIP: Talk to your guidance counsellor. Let them know you are interested in scholarships. They may be your BEST resource!

GRADES 10 & 11

Shad Canada

ShadOnCampus (live in residence) and ShadAnywhere (digital campus). Open to Grades 10 and 11 students who are community-minded, creative, engaged, curious and want to make an impact in Canada and the world. International baccalaureate students can qualify for the creativity aspect of CAS through Shad participation. Shad is a month-long summer program focused on STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and math) and entrepreneurship. Students stay in residence at one of twenty-two Canadian universities. SHAD partners with organizations across Canada who help connect them with students who are traditionally underrepresented in STEAM. If you are enrolled with one of these Shadverified partners, you can apply for a scholarship via the application. Shad Canada offers financial support for full or partial program fees to those with demonstrated financial need. Click here for financial support opportunities and ideas. Note: Several universities offer exclusive scholarships and awards to Shad alumni. **Deadline:** December 1. Inquiries: info@shad.ca.

Aboriginal Financial Officers Association of Canada (AFOA): Nutrien Indigenous Youth Financial Management Awards

Open to youth of Indigenous ancestry in Grades 11 and 12 pursuing postsecondary in areas of finance, management, commerce, accounting, or related fields. The applicant must be academically successful. **Award:** Three recipients will receive a five-

year scholarship package valued at over \$5,000; complimentary travel to the AFOA National Conference in Winnipeg, Manitoba, March 2024. **Deadline:** November 30.

Applications for the <u>Horatio Alger</u> <u>Association of Canada National</u> <u>Entrepreneurial and Canadian Scholarships</u> open November 1! Scholarships of up to \$10,000 are awarded to full-time students in Grade 11 with financial need (family income under \$65,000) who have demonstrated integrity and perseverance in overcoming adversity, a commitment to pursue a post-secondary education, a desire to contribute to society, and a good academic record.



GRADE 11

The Bronfman Fellowship

You do not need to be a top student to be a Bronfman Fellow; innovative thinking and creativity are valued more than a high GPA. Every year, twenty-six intellectually curious North American teenagers are selected as Bronfman Fellows. The Fellowship begins with a free, immersive summer program, and continues with monthly virtual experiences and a winter and spring seminar in the U.S.

Eligibility: The Bronfman Fellowship is open to high school students who are in the 11th Grade in the fall of 2023, who self-identify as Jewish, and who are from the United States or Canada. The application consists of various short responses, short essays, a one-minute video, your school transcript, and recommendations with at least one from a teacher. GOVERNMENT OF ONTARIO AWARDS

Ontario Volunteer Service Awards Nomination required. Organizations that have been in existence for a minimum of five years may submit a nomination. This award recognizes volunteers for providing committed and dedicated service to an organization. Youth (24 years old and under) are recognized for two or more years of continuous service. The nominee must be a resident and volunteer in Ontario. Deadline: November 15.

Government of Ontario: David C. Onley Award for Leadership in Accessibility: Youth Leadership Award

Open to a young person (16-24) who shows leadership and commitment to developing the potential of people with disabilities. They must be a resident of Ontario. **Award:** \$5,000. **Deadline:** December 3.

The Lester B. Pearson International Student Scholarships

Nomination required.

Awarded annually, these scholarships recognize outstanding students from around the world, including international students studying at Canadian high schools. This is U of T's most prestigious and competitive scholarship for international students. To become a Pearson Scholar, you must be nominated by your school and apply to undergraduate studies at the University of Toronto. Ask your school guidance counsellor about being nominated. Pearson Scholars are students who have demonstrated exceptional academic achievement and creativity, who are accepted as leaders within their school, and who have the potential to contribute to the global community in the future. They can be distinguished from other students who may have equally high academic results by virtue of their breadth of interest. intellectual energy, and impact on the life of their school and community. Each year approximately thirty-seven students will be named Lester B. Pearson Scholars. To be eligible to apply, you must be an international student, i.e., a non-Canadian requiring a study permit; currently in your final year of secondary school or have graduated no earlier than June 2023; and beginning your studies at the University of Toronto in September 2024.

Award: The Pearson International Scholarships cover tuition, books, incidental fees, and full residence support for four years. The scholarship is tenable only at the University of Toronto.

Pearson Scholarship Deadlines:

• School nomination deadline: November 30.

• Student OUAC application deadline: December 15 (Please note this is the final date to apply to the OUAC; however, it is recommended you apply for admission through the OUAC before November 7 as spaces in programs fill up quickly and popular programs may close early.).

• Student scholarship application deadline: January 15, 2024.

Queen's University Major Admission Awards (MAA)

Students who demonstrate superior academic ability, creative and original thinking, involvement in school or community activities, and proven leadership can apply for a Queen's Major Admission Award. Financial need is also a consideration for some of the Major Admission Awards. The Awards are available to Canadian citizens and permanent residents of Canada. You may attend high school in Canada or internationally. Students taking a gap year can still apply for the Major Admission Awards. Note: To be considered for a **Chancellor's Scholarship**, the applicant must receive a **nomination** from the high school principal where they most recently attended fulltime study. The number of nominations per high school is based on graduating class size: Less than 250: One nominee; 250-499: Up to two nominees; 500 or greater: Up to three nominees.

Awards: Varying (\$36,000-\$60,000 over four years). **Deadline:** December 8.
